# **Listening & Speaking:**

- 1) Interact with other children who speak English

## Reading:

Research clearly shows that daily reading is the best way for a student to build her reading skills and vocabulary. Reading also exposes students to a variety of ways to structure sentences and to organize ideas, which is reflected in her writing. Any way that you can encourage your daughter to read over the summer will make a difference. She can read broadly from the grade-level summer reading lists, in addition to other genres and print material.

To build reading comprehension skills, practice these reading strategies with your daughter as she reads:

**PREDICT** what will happen next.

**CLARIFY** when something is confusing.

**PICTURE** what you are reading in your mind. **ASK QUESTIONS** to learn more.

**SUMMARIZE** what has happened in the story.

**MAKE CONNECTIONS** between what you are reading and your own experience or other books you have read. **ANALYZE** the language and structure of the book. Why does the author make those particular choices? How do those choices impact you as a reader?

- Consider reading or listening to the same book—the conversations you have about it are authentic and will promote thinking, without feeling like you're quizzing each other.
- Remember, listening to a book can be a great road trip option, and all of the same comprehension skills apply!

# Writing:

Summer is also a great time for girls to do some writing, especially since they can choose their topics, audiences and formats. Stories, journals and letters are all great options—even sending postcards of summer adventures. For something more structured, this website provides daily writing prompts and exercises:
